<p>The author quotes W.M.Housman – “The southern border of Westmorland and that part of North Lancashire which strikes its wedge-end in between Westmorland..... and Yorkshire.....was the northern stronghold if not the fountain-head of the original Longhorn breed”</p> <p>Not until about 1830 did Parliament legislate to forbid the practice of rams being turned onto commons after 20th August each year to prevent injury to sheep by the use of “paltry” rams. The total prevention of rams being pastured on commons or waste was not accomplished until 1908.</p> <p>1799 Kendal Agricultural Society founded p.210</p> <p>Pp.127 – 128 : History of the market at Kirkby Lonsdale.</p> <p>1839 Lunesdale Agricultural Society founded, renamed Kirkby Lonsdale Association in 1862. In 1909 the War Office offered prizes for remount horses that could then be purchased by the Remount Officer at set prices of £65 for a charger, £30 for a cob and £40 “others”.</p> <p>1871 The Earl of Bective borrowed £20,000 by a rent charge as an “improvement loan” to use in the parishes of Kirkby Lonsdale, Whittington and Sedbergh.</p> <p>1872 Casterton, Barbon and Middleton started a weekly butter and egg market on Tuesdays at the Station Inn (Middleton Arms) commencing at 3pm</p> <p>Pp.87-88 Commutation of Tithes in Kirkby Lonsdale Parish (Hutton Roof, Casterton, Barbon and Middleton)</p>
